## From the President's Classroom:

I would like to start out with some good news. ODE has begun the process of searching for a new Consultant/Liaison to replace Jeff Akers, who officially retired on December 31. It is my understanding that ODE would like to have that person in place sometime this spring. This is exciting news as we were concerned that Jeff would not be replaced and the partnership and collaboration formerly enjoyed between CBI and the State of Ohio would come to an end. The ultimate consequence could have been a weak and voiceless CBI Board of Directors and CBI Division. I am pleased to know this will not happen now. It is my hope we will be able to introduce the new Consultant at the CBI Professional Development Conference in May. The Board has been in the process of revising the Constitution and Bylaws that govern our organization. It has been a long tedious and somewhat stressful journey. Denise Porter and Kate Zarouk have spent many hours that have culminated in a document that better fits the needs of CBI today. The final version will be disseminated to the CBI membership via email, for review, and a vote for ratification will take place during Spring Conference. A number of Regions are currently without representation or are under- represented. Each of the 11 Regions has two seats on the CBI Board of Directors. It is important to our solidarity that all Regions be represented.

I am aware that with budgetary concerns and the tightening of purse strings at local school districts, fewer Coordinators are being given the time and financing to participate in out of district meetings and functions associated with Board member responsibilities. The end result is that we can't get new people to step up to leadership roles and it's more difficult for those of us already serving. I know too, that many of us are taking on additional responsibilities and/or educational opportunities to enhance or "survive" our own economic situations, thereby creating conflicts with scheduled meetings and Board responsibilities. However, that being said, maybe we need to model the behaviors we are teaching our students, namely Service Learning; volunteering, and giving back to the community. In this case the community is the CBI family. So I am asking those of you who have an interest and would like to become actively involved at a level where you can make a difference. to please consider becoming a Regional Representative and a member of the CBI Board of Directors. We are a diverse group from all over the State with one thing in common...our CBI students. # **Knowledge Bowl**

For 18 points, what is the capital of Georgia? For 15 points, spell unemployment! Another year of Knowledge Bowl is culminating with regional competitions and a state con-

test to see who will be the 2010 state champion!

For those who are not familiar with the Knowledge Bowl Program, it is a state-wide competition between CBI units using a database of approximately 2000 OGT related questions. The program is broken up into 20 categories containing about 100 questions each. Competitions are held in individual regions throughout the state. The first and second place winners from each region are then invited to compete at the state competition. New this year, teams that have scored at least 80% of the possible points for the competition, will also be invited to the state competition. Since space is limited to 40 teams, teams that have scored

80% of the possible points will be accepted to the state competition on a

first-come first-serve basis.

This year's state competition will be held at 10:00 am on April 16 at the First Church of the Nazarene, (Coshocton Ave.) Mount Vernon, Ohio. Knowledge Bowl promotes teamwork, encourages self esteem and instills in the student a sense of pride for their individual

# From the President-Elect Desk by Mike Rodak

(In a continuing article, Mike Rodak gives suggestions for ways to market your program)

### Market your program through your students

Most of our students have never been on a team or understand their value and responsibilities within an organization. Preach-Preach-Preach how the students before them changed the way others look at the program. Tell them how important it is to represent the program. Give them specific examples of how complaining about the program in public casts a negative shadow on it, and how bragging about it makes it look so good. Teach them how their improvement makes the whole group/class look better. Now, practice what you preach. Compliment them any chance you get. Reward the students' success by taking them to lunch and on field trips. Brag, brag, brag, about how great your job is and how challenging, yet rewarding the kids are.

## Use your funding for professional development

Attend both your regional meeting and state conference on a regular basis. Your program funding CAN be used for your professional development and specifically these meetings. Go to the "Administrative Manual" on the state's website and copy the pages that state how your state funding can be used. Showing your administration and treasurer that you know what the funds can be used for is a great proactive approach to getting these professional activities approved. ALWAYS follow up with your administration upon your return and find one or two bits of info that your administration may not have known, like the dissolving of the OGT exams.

## Go visit a neighboring program in another district.

Take the time to ask for professional leave to observe other programs as a part of your self-improvement plan. Let your district see that you are keeping up on what other districts are doing to meet the needs of the at-risk population in their districts. Choose a district that is similar to yours in demographics, so you can justify what is working. Again, ALWAYS follow up your visit by sharing with your administration about the things that you observed and how you think it may benefit your program and district.

## Nothing is worse than a "stagnant" teacher and program

The worst thing that you could do is nothing. Keep doing the same things over and over and sooner or later you will be viewed in a negative light. Always share the new techniques you are trying and implementing. Always let the teachers know you are researching and making an effort to change for the better. Even if your program is successful, you need to find ways to constantly improve and let EVERYONE know that you are on a mission to constantly improve.

### Partner with a civic group, present an award in their name

When going out and speaking to civic organizations, give them a handout to share with other colleagues that are not at the presentation. On the handout, list ways they could help your program. Along with assisting in the classroom, they could also pay for a field trip, serve as a guest speaker or sponsor a job shadowing station. Ask them to co-present an award to one of your students at a breakfast, lunch or year end banquet. Coordinate the award so it matches their group motto or mission and have their organizations name on it. Involve them in the process of choosing the recipient. Our local Rotary Club gives scholarship money to our kids. The three finalists attend one of their meetings and speak to the group explaining how they have benefited from the program, and their future career plans. The Rotary Club has a panel that chooses the finalist.

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# Skills USA by Jim Beck

Description: Students (3 maximum) must design and construct a bulletin board that relates to the 2010 National theme, "SkillsUSA Champions At Work,

Connecting the Opportunities". The board must be entirely of paper products and be smaller than 48" x 48", and cost less than \$100. One team member must present a speech of 3-5 minutes explaining the board and its educational value; the teams participation; the design, scope and sequence; construction of the

board; how the board pertains to the National theme; and how/where the board will be used.

There must also be a 20 page notebook/scrapbook depicting with captions and photos the building the board and an administrators verification of costs and creativity letter. The student must use the book as a visual aid in the presentation as well as the board itself.

The kids have been working on the project for about 3 -4 weeks. The entire team collaborated in the design of the project. Dylan was responsible for most of the board's physical creation and laser work. Tiffani and Shiann worked more on the speech and the scrapbook. Tiffani presented at the South Central Regional Contest held March 6, 2010 at the Delaware Area Career Center. The combination of the board, notebook, and presentation earned the team a gold medal. The first place finish qualifies the team to compete at the Ohio State Championships held April 23/24 at the Ohio State Fairgrounds against the 17 other winners of the other 5 regions in Ohio. At stake is the opportunity to represent Ohio at the SkillsUSA National competition held each year in Kansas City, Mo. This is the 6th year the CBI-Graphics class has competed in the SkillsUSA Promotional Bulletin Board competition. They have earned the privilege to represent

Ohio at Nationals 3 times, hopefully this will be the 4th time! Jim Beck is a CBI Coordinator at the Delaware Area Career Center

The Association for Career and Technical Education (ACTE) announced in the summer of 2009 that Nicki Wright was the Regional Teacher of the Year. Wright is a Career Based Intervention (CBI) teacher at Delaware City Schools Dempsey Middle School, a program through the Delaware Area Career Center.

Wright has taught Career-Based Intervention programs for ten years, the last four years at Dempsey Middle School. Her ability to implement unique educational opportunities for at risk students earned the 2009 award. Car detailing, candy making, poinsettia sales and other activities allowed her to get students involved in their learning by using lessons of economics, leadership and work skills.

She also emphasizes community service by getting students involved in Earth

Day, the Veteran's Day Parade and holiday fundraisers.

"Nicki is not someone who settles for the status quo," said Mary Beth Freeman, Superintendent of the Delaware Area Career Center. "When it comes time to tap the person who will accept any challenge and complete it to the highest of standards, Nicki Wright immediately comes to mind. Whether it is serving on multiple committees, partnering with community initiatives, or taking the time to provide a listening ear to students and colleagues, Nicki, through her work ethic and integrity, will always exceed the standards."

This honor was awarded to Wright after the Ohio ACTE named her State Teacher of the Year at July's All-Ohio Conference. An awards dinner was held for the winner of each region on November 18th, 2009 where Wright interviewed with the ACTE Awards Committee for the title of National Teacher of the Year. Although she did not receive the national title, she states it was a true pleasure to visit the ACTE conference in Nashville to promote what good things are happening in CBI programs around Ohio.

## The End of an Era in Education

January 1, 2010 marked an end of an era in education. The date is significant because it was the last day of educational service of one of our most valued contributors, Jeff Akers.

After graduating from Preble Shawnee High School, Camden, Ohio, Jeff served two years in the Army. He stated that his military experience gave him the opportunity to travel and realize what he wanted to do with his life. When his military commitment was served, he took advantage of the G. I. Bill benefit and pursued a degree in Education from Eastern Kentucky University.

Jeff's first teaching experience began in January of 1975, at Ohio City Liberty High School, in Van Wert County. Like many of us, his career took many twists and turns and finally, he found his true niche'. Students at risk of not graduating from high school became his full focus. He wanted to understand the barriers that kept students from being successful and then find ways to help those students overcome those barriers. Due to his compassion and dedication, Jeff was able to make a big difference in the lives of many students over the years. During this time, he was asked to serve as a teacher educator at the University level. In this role, he prepared new CBI teachers to serve the needs of at-risk students. Each class contained a wealth of information on various teaching methods to reach students that many thought were un-reachable.

In January of 2001, Jeff's career took another turn. He was hired to be the Career Based Intervention Consultant for the Ohio Department of Education. In this position, Jeff was the liaison between ODE and the CBI board of directors. He was the resource that superintendants, principals, teachers and employers contacted to gain information on Ohio labor laws, variances, CBI models, the EMIS reporting system, and Career Tech Weighted funding for various CBI programs all over the state. He also was responsible for approving all new CBI programs that were requested by school districts.

## The End of an Era in Education Continued

Mr. Akers laments that we (as educators in the state) do not get the opportunity to work with potentially at-risk students early enough in their educational careers. He feels that if these students could be indentified at a younger age, we could do more to keep them on track toward graduation and further success.

Jeff is proud to have been a part of a state educational system that values ALL students of ALL abilities from the at-risk to the gifted students.

I have had the pleasure of knowing Mr. Akers for many years and I am proud to say that he has served as a mentor and role model for me. I have admired his dedication and commitment to the cause of our at-risk youth of Ohio. Jeff is a man of his word. When he makes the decision to accomplish a task...you can bet it will be done, done well and in a timely fashion. He has always been approachable. If any of us had a problem or a concern about a student or a situation in our school environment, Jeff was always willing to lend an ear and offer advice based on his many years of experience.

Mr. Akers stated, "It's been a great run and I'm thankful I've had the opportunity to work with so many incredible students, dedicated teachers, and other professionals that make the education engine operate. I will miss being involved."

He has plans to enjoy family activities, traveling, and his private woodworking shop without having to keep a schedule or look at a watch! Jeff, you will truly be missed.

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The Bellaire Middle School Career Connection Class participates in many activities throughout the school year. One, they could make it to the state competition and two, they are practicing for the OAT and it is effortless.

# The Importance of OACTE

According to everyone I have talked to who has had experience with state government, this year's state budget process was the most "interesting" it has ever been. Signed by Governor Strickland on July 17, the budget is more than 3,000 pages long and about 700 of those pages deal with education. This is not surprising, since Governor Strickland's January 2009 State of the State Address talked about his vision for education in Ohio.

While our legislative advisors tell us that career-technical education was funded at the same amount as last year, and even received an increase, there are other parts of the budget bill that cause concern. For example, new language in the bill (Ohio Revised Code §3313.642) states that "no board of education of a school district shall charge a fee to a pupil who is eligible for a free lunch...for any materials needed...to participate fully in a course of instruction." This applies to CTE programs as well.

House Bill 1 also creates a permanent Ohio School Funding Advisory Council to provide recommendations to the State Board, the General Assembly and the public every two years on the adequacy of the evidence-based school funding model (EBM). The current make-up of the Council does not specifically include representation from career-technical education, yet the Council's financing recommendations will cover funding for CTE programs.

These two provisions alone remind me that our legislators don't understand career-technical education, its importance to students and the positive impact CTE has on Ohio's economy. Career-technical educators can't afford to let state government representatives make decisions without realizing how important CTE is to Ohio's public education system, students and their state and local economy. While CTE may have survived the latest budget battle, it's only a matter of time before the Funding Council or another group decides that career-technical education isn't important.

In today's environment of uncertainty, we know for certain that more budget cuts are going to happen. The question becomes how well we can inform and educate legislators of the positive impact career and technical programs have on the economy at both the state and local level.

Your Ohio ACTE leadership is committed to the cause, but needs the support of each and every career-technical professional.

It doesn't matter whether you work in a career center, compact or comprehensive. It doesn't matter if you represent agriculture or academics. Quit identifying yourself with a specific delivery method or specialized area and begin to advocate for career-technical education. Renew your own membership and find someone in your educational institution that is not a member and stress the importance of joining Ohio ACTE.
