Inaugural Newsletter 2009



Fair Labor Standards Act



Minimum wage has changed both federally and in Ohio.

The following is from the Ohio Department of Commerce, Division of Labor and Workers Safety, Bureau of Wage and Hour:

State minimum wage is \$7.30 per hour if the employer is grossing \$267,000 or more per year. *Tipped employers are to receive \$3.65 per hour.

If the employer is grossing less than this dollar volume the federal minimum wage is \$6.55 per hour.

Minors who are 14 – 15 years of age will receive the \$6.55 per hour (FLSA rate) no matter what the employer grosses. *Tipped employers are to receive \$2.13 per hour.

If an employee's tips combined with the employer's cash wage (direct wage) do not equal the minimum hourly wage, the employer must make up the difference.

State minimum wage is adjusted on January 1 of each year based on this statement from the Ohio Constitution:

§ 2.34a Minimum Wage

Except as provided in this section, every employer shall pay their employees a wage rate of not less than six dollars and eighty-five cents per hour beginning January 1, 2007. On the thirtieth day of each September, beginning in 2007, this state minimum wage rate shall be increased effective the first day of the following January by the rate of inflation for the twelve month period prior to that September according to the consumer price index or its successor index for all urban wage earners and clerical workers for all items as calculated by the federal government rounded to the nearest five cents.

Fair Labor Standards Act - Federal Minimum Wage regulation states: covered, nonexempt workers are entitled to a minimum wage of not less than \$6.55 per hour effective July 24, 2008; and \$7.25 per hour effective July 24, 2009.

Tipped employees are individuals engaged in occupations in which they customarily and regularly receive more than \$30 a month in tips. The employer may consider tips as part of wages, but the employer must pay at least \$2.13 an hour in direct wages.

Regional Spotlight: Region 1

The following is a news article as it appeared in <u>This Week</u>, a community newspaper in the Upper Arlington, Ohio area.) Wednesday, November 19, 2008 2:01 PM

Instead of having to leave school grounds to get a cup of coffee in the mornings, teachers, students and administrators at Upper Arlington High School will soon be able to pick up a "cup o' joe" in the cafeteria.

The UA Rise Café, a student-run coffee shop, is scheduled to open in January. Students and teachers involved in the school's Career Based Intervention and UA Connect programs presented their plans to the board of education Monday night. The shop will offer hot, iced and blended coffee drinks as well as tea and fruit smoothies and will serve the high school and surrounding Upper Arlington community, the students said.

"It'll also become a place like Caribou (Coffee) where students can study with friends," said student Hillary Stempowski.

The UA Rise Café will enable students in the CBI and UA Connect programs to develop leadership and entrepreneurial skills, said teachers **Steve Colahan and Karen D'Eramo**.

"It's a program where we work with students who typically might not be engaged in school," D'Eramo said.

CBI and UA Connect are work/study programs that encourage students to explore various careers and prepare them for independent living after graduation. The programs assist "at-risk" students who have academic problems, attendance and behavioral issues and/or economic hardships.

The 20 UAHS students involved in the CBI and UA Connect programs work part-time and earn academic credits on an abbreviated schedule. The students will trade duties staffing the UA Rise Café, which will be open weekdays from 7:30 to 8 a.m. and during lunch periods.

The school has partnered with local coffee roaster Crimson Cup, which will supply materials, training and ongoing support to the students. The Upper Arlington Chamber Commerce, Donatos Pizza and Cameron Mitchell Restaurants have also pledged promotional support.

In addition to coffee and beverages, plans also call for the UA Rise Café to offer pastries that will be supplied by the school district's Food Services department. "Food Services could supply muffins and biscotti, and they could be a sub-vendor," said Paul Craft, the district's executive director of business services.

Plans call for the coffee shop to donate 10 percent of profits to the Mid-Ohio Food Bank. The UA Rise Café will also generate funds to provide mini-grants for teachers for special projects.

The coffee shop will also display student art.

He has been a member for all of those years and is the current president of the association. George has served 9 years on the CBI Board and during that time was the lead Region 10 representative. George also owns and operates Avondale Home Improvements in his spare time. ©

George has helped me tremendously over the years. I remember the first year I began our OWA program at Gravel Hill School. I explained to George I needed math information for review. The next day George had an entire program copied for me that he designed to help a student progress independently. George has always had creative and innovative ideas to motivate and inspire students.

In closing, I hope this letter was in vain. I am still trying to use my wiles to encourage George to stay in the classroom, continue as BCWCA president, remain on the board, and come out of retirement before he goes in.

Knowledge Bowl

Knowledge Bowl (KB): busy work, Ohio Graduation Test Prep, or more? Knowledge Bowl is a team building, character building, responsibility building, and excitement building competition. A chance for everyone in the class to excel in one or more areas, from core academics, sports, arts, or life related skills. Students start to get excited about assignments without even knowing they are learning.

Knowledge Bowl was always about the student. It was written by Coordinators, starting out with OWE (Occupational Work Experience) as part of the VICA (Vocational Industrial Club of America) competition and then moving to our own CBI-CC competition. The questions have moved from being about the 9th grade test with life/work skills to the Ohio Graduation Test with the life/ work skills.

In hopes to get more Coordinators and students involved with the use of Knowledge Bowl, the CBI Board gave out Knowledge Bowl Disk this year. There were 83 Coordinators belonging to ACTE (Association for Career and Technical Education) that were able to make use of the \$40.00 savings. Administrative Rule Change Will

Provide Individual Program Performance Data

The Ohio Board of Education has given preliminary approval the administrative rule changes to Career Based Intervention. Final approval by the Ohio legislation is anticipated by late May. The rule change will provide the Ohio Department of Education, local districts and community schools with individual program performance data. The reporting of the performance data will be mandatory. The data will be used by the State Department of Education for the purposes of program improvement and continued program funding. The following are the proposed data sets:

- (1) Transition rate to the next grade level of students in grades seven through eleven participating in any CBI model
- (2) Graduation rate of grade twelve students participating in any high school CBI model
- (3) Attendance rate of students in the year of participation in any CBI model
- (4) Discipline rate of students in the year of participation in any CBI model
- (5) Rate of students participating in any CBI model who drop out of school
- (6) Transition rate to a high school career-technical education CTE workforce development program
- (7) Passage rate on state required academic assessments in the year of participation in any CBI model.
