Each year the Oak Harbor 7th and 8th grade CBI classes team up with Oak Harbor High School Agricultural Science students to organize a charity toy drive. Students in the Middle and High Schools create posters and announcements to advertise the event throughout their buildings.

Students bring in new toys during the few weeks after Thanksgiving to be donated to the Ottawa County Holiday Bureau's Toys for Tots.
