What a First-Time CBI Teacher really needs to know.

We asked some accomplished CBI teachers the things they would've done differently when they started their programs.

Mike Rodak: Strongsville High School.

"For starters, I would reach out to the neighboring districts' CBI teachers to find myself a mentor. It took me almost 5 months to reach out to other schools to find out that the local CBI teachers met every Friday for lunch. As soon as I started attending those meetings, the other coordinators began to guide me and mentor me.

Next, I would reach out to the local civic organizations and introduce myself and what I do and share how they can help me. I was almost 10 years into my tenure as a CBI teacher before I did this. It legitimizes your program when the local community supports you.

I would put more effort into service learning projects. I would spend more time marketing the program to get field trips funded by outside sources instead of begging for money.

I would not be so intimidated by the board of education and central office admin.

Share what the program is doing and share the success stories of the students you work with. Ask parents to write letters of support so the upper admin knows the parents appreciate your efforts.

I would also take advantage of the "Partnership" award at the CBI spring conference. Now, each year I nominate a program partner and recognize them at the program each year.

They meet me for dinner and the evening reception. I brag about them at the presentation. I make them a picture frame with their photo and photos of them with the kids and some memorabilia of the events they support. It gives them something to hang in their office and brag about.

"Share what the program is doing and share the success stories of the students you work with."

I also present them to our Board at a meeting so everyone sees the role they play in the program. I would religiously attend all regional meetings and spring conference every year.

Finally, I would create traditions within my program that the students can talk about for years to come, like doing the same service projects each year, having an academic honors club, the same field trips, record the same skits and save them for the kids to view at their reunions. Create traditions because they may not experience any through sports or clubs. Create a hall of fame for those that graduate and move on to receive training in a career of interest and work in that field. And have a yearly lunch or dinner to honor one of them in front of your kids."

Amy Wagner: Bunsold Middle School. "If I could go back in time to my first year of teaching CBI, I would reach out to the other CBI teachers in my area more for help whether that be with resources, ideas, lessons or program

Another thing I would have done differently would have been building a solid recruitment and student selection process earlier instead of allowing someone else to choose my students and have them placed in my program. Being an active part of that process has proven to be valuable as we serve students in our district."

Robin Judd: Twin Valley South High School. "Communicate more with parents. Texting and personal phone calls work much better than e-mailing.

Cell phones are placed in a pocket at the front of the room Day 1 and for the duration of the class period. A signed Cell Phone Use contract lays out the repercussions, whatever you chose for them to be.

Don't assign any work that can't be completed during class time."

"I would reach out to the other CBI teachers in my area more for help whether that be with resources, ideas, lessons or program questions." Mary Jo Hines: Mound Street Academies "I would have been more emphatic towards my students and tried harder to get to know them and each of their stories. I've learned that this is the key to working with some of our CBI students. They need to understand you are on their side and wanting what is best for them."

Ali Peterson: Graham High School – Ohio Hi Point Career Center "I would have built a stronger advisory committee sooner instead of starting with what I came into. I still have room for improvement in this area, but it would definitely help with some of the struggles that I face within my building and with getting students employed."

Scott A Davis: West Branch School District/ Mahoning County Career and Technical Center. "For whatever reason I was really intimidated by the parents of my students. After a while I began to realize that it was all in my head and the parents of my students wanted the same things that I wanted for their children. My advice would be to make a real effort to get to know all of your student's parents. It can be a big undertaking but it makes your job a lot easier when the parents know what your goals for your program and their child are. Another thing would be to make sure parents are getting the information you are putting out. Just because you have a web page, write a newsletter,

send things home, etc., doesn't always mean that the parents are in the loop. A simple phone call can work wonders.

Lastly, don't be afraid to ask the community for help. My program has had projects over the vears that have been in the news and it is amazing at how many people saw or heard about our project and volunteered money, time, advice, without being asked. Many of them were not your typical business owners or community leaders, they just lived in the community and wanted to help. As a new CBI Coordinator, take some time and get out there. Let the community know who you are, why you are there, what your program is doing. I think you will really be surprised at the response you get."

One last note to all of the CBI teachers out there. You have a dedicated board of directors located throughout the state who are there to support you with any and all means at their disposal. Please do not hesitate to get in touch with your regional representative to ask for advice, lesson plan ideas, ODE questions, or anything else you can think of. Keep in touch with them, go to the regional meetings, check the CBI-Ohio web page for meeting dates, register and attend the yearly CBI Conference. There is a fantastic support system at your disposal, all you have to do is ask and you will get the help and support you need.





Mound Street Academy CBI students have begun working with Restorative Justice Arts (Founded by Deron Bell) in a 5 week pilot program that focuses on socioemotional development through music. The webbased program www. mymusiced.com will be used as one of the instructional tools. This is brought to the students by the school's partnership with the Hopeful Steps Mentoring Program.

Samantha Coffman, Miranda Hinchliffe, and Seth Lee, members of the West Branch High School and Brian Boston, a member of the West Branch Middle School Career Based Intervention (CBI) program are participating in the OMB Warehouse Mini Bike Build-Off this year. Each year participants from all over the United States, Europe, and Australia compete against one another to see who can build/restore the best mini bike. Participants must post the progress of their build on the OMB web site at least once a month. When the mini bike is complete it must run and be in "rideable" condition. The finished mini bikes are then posted on the OMB web site and all of the members throughout the world vote on the top three mini bikes in each class. This year the high school team is restoring a 1963 Tote Gote Model 404. They will be competing in the "Vintage" Class. The team from the middle school is competing in the "18 and Under Class". He is restoring a 1970 Fox Sprite. Each participant is responsible for taking the bike apart, assessing what needs to be replaced or repaired, searching for replacement parts, as well as placing the orders with various vendors. The students are learning about how to work as a team, leadership skills, as well as Safety in the Workplace and how to use hand tools safely and properly. Contact Your Board Members

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Greetings from Columbus, OH!

Here's a short update on the latest CBI-relevant happenings from the Ohio Department of Education and the Office of Career-Technical Education:

- CTE-26 Program Applications: The CTE-26 application closed for the 2019-2020 school year on March 1st, 2019. Districts with approved applications will be notified by May 15th, 2019. We will likely have over 300 approved programs statewide in FY2019!
- New Graduation Requirements for the Class of 2019 & Damp; 2020: Temporary Ohio law provided additional graduation options for students in the class of 2018, specifically, students who entered grade 9 between July 1, 2014, and June 30, 2015. Recent legislation extended additional graduation options to the classes of 2019 and 2020. Part of the additional options speak to student work experience and community service. More information can be found at: education.ohio.gov/Topics/Ohio-s-Graduation-Requirements
- **CBI Webpage:** If you have provided feedback on the materials and resources currently available on the Ohio Department of Education's CBI webpage, thank you! I am working diligently to make necessary updates and changes, with the ultimate goal of a much more organized and effective site.
- CBI Annual Program Review & Assessment: We are working to develop an Annual Program Review based on the APR for Workforce Development programs. The current CTE Quality Program Standards will be updated to reflect the unique program criteria of CBI.

 As a part of this Annual Program Review, we are designing and piloting a Risk Assessment, wherein data from schools that offer CBI will be assessed, and will help to identify schools that will participate in on-site reviews, annually.

The purpose of the Risk Assessment and the Annual Program Review is to provide additional supports to schools in delivering quality CBI programs for students.

- FY23 Program Renewal & Surances: The work done through the Annual Program Review and Risk Assessment will inform long-term goals related to the next program approval cycle for CBI.
 We anticipate that the Program Assurances for these applications will be updated to reflect program needs as identified through the Annual Program Review.
- **CBI Technical Content Standards:** Please anticipate updates to the CBI Technical Content Standards after the Annual Program Review and Quality Program Standards have been finalized. As updates occur and CBI program guidance is produced, there will always be opportunities for comment and feedback from stakeholders. In the meantime, please reach out with any questions or suggestions!
